It was a rainy day and we walked through the city of the Jews, the weather reflecting our mood. After this excursion we went out to eat in a typical Jewish restaurant. We

ate onion-caramel soup and a typical salad.





In the afternoon, we arrived at our host families homes. My host family was very nice and the house was very beautiful. I got a special dessert to eat, some jelly with fruit in it. 
